Girls are almost **3X** more likely to consider careers in science, math and engineering if they participate in science fairs and summer camps, particularly in the early grades, according to a new Canadian report.

A study by researchers at Mount Saint Vincent University in Halifax also suggests that **good grades** and teacher influence matter less than exposure to these outside-theclassroom activities.
